### **Presidents Report**

I am pleased to bring you Baseball NSW (BNSW) 2022/23 Annual Report.

#### A year of change and renewed focus.

After many years as a Director and President at BNSW, Ross Morrison stepped down from the Board of Management in November to spend time with family but thankfully, will still stay connected with our sport at a local level. As a result of this and other changes, the Board recently welcomed Bill Langler to the Board as an Independent Director. Bill served as the Country League Standing Committee Chairman for over 10 years and holds degrees in Economics and Law from the Australian National University.

In February, the CEO and I attended a two-day seminar held by Baseball Australia titled "Shaping the Future of Baseball in Australia". Attended by other State and Territory executives and Board members, issues of participation, the sport's alignment with Little League International, sustainability, pathways, facilities and shifting behavioural trends impacting our sport were discussed. While there was largely consensus, I observed that the different characteristics across States and Territories would necessarily result in different prioritisation and implementation timelines, albeit within the context of a shared National agenda. Many of the matters discussed are well known to the Board and indeed our members and are informing how we now prioritise, plan and collaborate with stakeholders to articulate and deliver our vision, purpose and principles.

Over the past twelve months, the Board has necessarily focused efforts on, among other things, increased levels of governance and addressing long-term strategic partnerships with Blacktown City Council with the new Sydney Blue Sox ownership group.

The previously disclosed Blacktown International Sports Park lease renewal remains in flight and is complicated by a \$2.9m funding grant received by BNSW to commence infrastructure enhancements at BISP that necessitates surety of a long-term lease. While there remains much to navigate, the Board remains optimistic that a mutually beneficial long-term arrangement can be achieved that meets the future needs of our sport, its members, and the community.



### Presidents Report Cont.

With 2023/24 ABL preparations underway, BNSW is excited by plans shared with it by the new independent Sydney Blue Sox ownership group. The importance of how the Blue Sox perform on and off the field, and how BNSW partners to make games more accessible to members cannot be overstated and as such, we look forward to a greater alignment with the Sydney Blue Sox and wish the organisation the very best for the coming season.

Baseball Australia in conjunction with BNSW again hosted the Australian Youth Championships at Blacktown earlier this year with eleven NSW players being selected to train on for final selection to represent Australia at the WBSC U18 World Cup held in Chinese Taipei last September. Pittwater Baseball Club did an exceptional job hosting State Little League, Intermediate League and Junior League Championships as did North Ryde RSL Junior Baseball Club who hosted Rookies in February. BNSW was very fortunate to host the Little League National Championships in June, aided by access to Softball NSW facilities while Lismore Baseball Association which has historically hosted this exciting event continues to recover from the devastating floods of 2022. Hills and Ryde would go on to take Little League and Senior League National honours representing Australia at Williamsport, Pennsylvania and Easley, South Carolina respectively. It was wonderful to see the BNSW Women's development program expand from twenty-nine to forty-nine players this year resulting in two teams competing at the 2022 Barclay Cup held on the Gold Coast. More on these and many other wonderful achievements can be found in the CEO and Baseball Development Manager's reports herein.

The organisation remains in a sound financial position with a modest profit in the last reporting period furthering balance sheet strength. This will be important in the context of in-flight lease renegotiations and separately, to provide financial agility to ensure the organisation's resources are appropriate to deliver its participation growth aspirations and meet the evolving needs of our sport and its members.

#### Looking ahead.

Thanks to the continued significant efforts of association and club volunteers, participation last season drew nearer to pre-pandemic levels with registration across the board down only slightly down on 2019/20 but over-indexing in T-Ball league ages.



# Presidents Report Cont.

While registration numbers for the season now commenced have further improved on last year, BNSW is investigating heightened communication, participation, and digital marketing opportunities to assist in the promotion of our sport at the grass-roots level in readiness for next Summer's recruitment schedule.

More broadly, our game has yet to realise its potential and among other things, is constrained by structural and resource limitations across our State, Winter, Women's, Country, Minor and Junior leagues. Given this and in consultation with a cross-section of stakeholders spanning the breadth of our community, the Board and management team have now commenced a review of specific leagues as to leave these challenges unattended would prove counter-productive to the growth and welfare of the sport for which we have a shared passion.

Operationally and off the back of the successful implementation of the Game Day registration platform, BNSW will lean into and optimise its coaching accreditation platform that in and of itself, has many positive attributes but also introduces unnecessary complexity when it comes to the reaccreditation of our largely volunteer coaches.

In closing and in no particular order, to club and association executive teams; umpires; scorers; coaches; canteen staff; uniform coordinators; registrars; grounds people and no doubt the many others whom I have unintentionally omitted and without whom our wonderful sport would not function, the BNSW Board and management team extend you its profound thanks for all you have and continue to do.

### **Chief Executive Officer Report**

2022-2023 saw a return to normality with the weather being kind and the majority of our competitions, events, and programming managing to be completed. A welcome relief from previous years that have been substantially disrupted.

Personnel changes at State and National levels have seen an injection of energy into the strategic direction of our sport that has been a boost to Baseball NSW's own strategic thinking. Meanwhile continuing to deliver on those existing principles that have guided us these past years.

#### Communication

We have been consistent in delivering on our Communication Strategy through the addition of a dedicated Communications Manager. We continued messaging via our digital and Social Media platforms as well as refining our technical platforms such as TeamApp, Game Changer, and Game Day which are integrated into our registration platform. The ability to share our good news stories with our members as well as keep them informed of what is happening throughout the community has been imperative.

This engagement with all our stakeholders, both at local and National levels, has allowed us to align our communications and messaging into a cohesive format. Regular engagement via our Monthly Newsletter ('the Pitch') as well as direct contact with our Standing League Committees and Strategic Planning sessions has been fundamental in making sure information is readily accessible.

#### Collaboration

This increased focus on our communication has allowed us to better engage with our stakeholders to provide input into our future Strategic Planning and better understand how we can provide support to our clubs and associations with their governance and administration. Online resources we have developed and shared with our members such as My Club and Childsafe.

Baseball Australia's Conference in February allowed the States to collectively consider how to best move forward with several initiatives to move our sport forward. Whether the continued adherence to the current Little League structure was the best solution or whether there may be more suitable solutions was topical and not without debate. Initiatives aimed at specifically identifying ways to grow participation and strengthen retention.

Our commitment to developing beneficial partnerships with various stakeholders has been seen in areas such as expanding our major events into the wider community venues, engagement with the Australian Baseball League (ABL) and the Sydney Blue Sox and boosting our Asia strategy via the signing of a historic Partnership Agreement with the Fukuoka Prefecture in Japan. An opportunity where we have a reciprocating tournament agreement that kicks off this October.



# Chief Executive Officer Report Cont.

We continue to be proactive in delivering programs to Primary and High Schools via our Sporting Schools Program as well as enlisting greater support from local and State Governments as seen by our many successful grant applications.

#### Community

As a family-centric sport Baseball continues to be a unifying force within the community where we have actively promoted Baseball as a 'Safe Place' to play sport. Our Member Protection practices have been stringently overhauled, and our increased awareness of member behaviour has been a focal point of the staff and Board.

We are continuing to promote positive events such as the Barclay Cup for our young girls, the Sydney Cup for our younger age groups, our Country Seniors Prague Tour, and the USA touring teams to the Cooperstown New York tournament where two NSW teams competed.

The expectation is to provide positive experiences for our members that will encourage them to want to return and play.

#### Cultivation

Baseball NSW continues to be successful in developing our up-and-coming talent. This can be seen in the representative numbers in the National teams. We have also been competitive at the National Youth & Women Championships as seen with our multiple teams in these events as well as the many 'friendship' players we have playing around the country for other states in the National Titles. These numbers can be seen in the Development Report.

It has been very exciting to see the many NSW representatives who have gone on to higher levels of competition abroad. Predominantly in US Colleges which is an amazing result when considered. Our aim is that this will translate into stronger participation in our local, state, and National Leagues.

One major focus area for BNSW is our continued work on developing an efficient Coach Accreditation Program. As is often the case, we are the pioneers in these National programs where we have unique requirements as the largest state in the Baseball Federation.

It has also been apparent that many of our members are looking for greater opportunities to play and learn at a higher level both domestically and abroad. Whilst we cannot be all things to all people, BNSW is looking at expanding our programming to provide these opportunities to the greater membership.

The ability of BNSW to bring in professional expertise from overseas as well as identify international tournaments has always been great. In addition to that we possibly have the best dedicated baseball facility in Australia. One that will soon have its own indoor training facility. Therefore, our aim is to provide these same opportunities and provide our members with the best programming available at an affordable level.

So, this past year has very much been getting on with business as usual. Going forward, Baseball NSW is looking at finalising our new Strategic Plan for 2024 and beyond and focusing on bringing our members along for the journey. Our financial health is strong, and our personnel are growing into their roles, so I see no reason not to be able to continue to prosper as a sport.

In closing, I must thank all of you, the members, who tirelessly work on keeping your teams going and functional. We could not do it without you. I would also like to thank the BNSW Board of Directors for their support and guidance as well as the BNSW staff, the backbone of the organisation. It has been a year of pulling together as a team and as a family, which makes it so much easier.

### **High Performance/Player Development Programs**

The 2023 BNSW High-Performance/Development programs were conducted over 10 weeks from mid-June to late August. There were 229 players selected to take part over 5 levels of our development system -

- National squad members
- Performance Pathway Program
- Developing Pathway Program
- Emerging Pathway Program
- Women's Developing Pathway Program

All these development programs had minimal disruptions this year which enabled the players involved to maximise the opportunity to work with the various instructors to improve their game.

#### National Squad Players (27 players)

This squad was comprised of players identified by Baseball Australia for World Cup preparation. They trained 3 times a week at BISP from March to August =

- o 16 players from NSW U18
- o 2 players from ACT U18
- 2 players from NSW Country U18
- 7 players from the NSW Women's team

#### Performance Pathway Program (32 players)

This program is comprised of 32 players selected from a trial process in May. This was an U/18 squad that trained 3 times a week for 10 weeks (June to August) at BISP with an emphasis on building up their strength, running speed, arm and bat velocity as well as game awareness.

They used development tools such as Driveline, BLAST motion bat sensors, RAPSODO ball flight technology, Speed Development/Mobility, and Strength & Conditioning programs.

Coaches were Phil Hemmer, Travis McDonald, Jason Dormor, Gavin Fingleson, Brendon Bojarski, Coen Wynne, Jack Dormor, Mark Shipley, Brad Griffin and myself.

#### Developing Pathway Program (32 players)

This program was comprised of 32 of the best U/16 age-eligible players selected after a trial process in May.

These players trained twice a week for 10 weeks (June to August) at BISP, building up their strength, running speed, arm and bat velocity as well as game awareness.

They have been using development tools such as Driveline, BLAST motion bat sensors, RAPSODO ball flight technology, Speed Development/Mobility, and Strength & Conditioning programs.

Coaches were James McCallum, James Sammes, Nick Chappell, Coen Wynne, Max Brennen, Vince Bates, Nathan Willard, Justin Chou and myself.



#### Strength and Conditioning

I would like to thank Johnny Freeston, Head Lecturer of Exercise Science at Sydney University, who has provided BNSW with his vast knowledge over the years.

A big thank you to Shane Cassel and Jack Dormor for the writing and delivery of the S&C programs for our squads in 2023. Shane and Jack ensured the exercises and loads undertaken by the players were appropriate for their age and physical maturity.

#### **Emerging Pathway Program (98 players)**

The EPP was again broken into 3 regions this year with the North running out of Golden Jubilee Field, the West running out of Col Sutton Reserve, and the South running out of Riverside Park. I want to thank the three clubs the Kuringai Stealers, Winston Hills Warriors, and the Vikings for allowing us to use their fields.

For the EPP we were able to provide winter development programs to 98 young athletes. The coaches we used in each program were outstanding and we are lucky to have them dedicate their time to the next crop of young Aussie baseball talent. The coaches for each program are –

#### Women's Developing Pathway Program (42 players)

Our Women's Development Program was a huge success this year, with a record number of players consistent with the rise in the profile of women's sports. It was held at BISP on a Tuesday/Thursday night for 8 weeks.

The young women had the chance to work with NSW and Australian Emeralds player Jordan Richardson who instructed the program before and after her World Cup commitments.

### **NSW Women's League Report**

### **Country League Report**

Despite the challenges of recent years, 2023 has seen a promising resurgence of NSW Country Baseball.

The CLSC has recognized for some time the need for forward planning. To that end, we held a planning workshop in April in Newcastle. The Workshop was well attended by representatives from each Association with some excellent ideas emerging to improve and develop Country Baseball over the next 5 years, incorporating development pathways from our juniors through to senior ranks. The Workshop was a resounding success, and a detailed plan is now being drafted which will be circulated to our Associations and the BNSW Board for approval in the coming months.

Our Women's and Under 18's Championships were held at Tamworth earlier this year in late June, with Central Coast winning the Women's Championship and Illawarra again taking out the Under 18's. The Men's A and B Division Championships were held at Blacktown in early August, with 5 teams competing in the A Division and 8 teams in the B Division. This is the most teams we have had for many years. Another pleasing feature was that the North Eastern Association from the Albury region also sent a side to compete. By all accounts, they will be back again next year and may also send sides to our Junior Country Championships. In a high-quality competition over the course of the weekend, Coffs Harbour was successful in winning the B division and Central Coast won the A division.

The Annual Tamworth Baseball Carnival over the June long weekend was again very well attended, with the NSW Country Men's Touring side winning the A division. The team then went on to further honours winning the bronze medal against the Austrian National Team at the prestigious Prague Baseball Week. The CLSC is very proud of this tour's continued success, which again was due to the outstanding work of Allan Parrott and Stephy Thompson. They will remain involved in mentoring roles from here on in, to ensure the continued success of what is, as far as I am aware, the only touring men's baseball team outside our national teams. As a result of the connections and goodwill generated from this tour, we now have the opportunity to send an Under 19's team to tour Germany next year. EOIs will be issued shortly for that proposed tour.

Our Junior Country Championships will again be held at Coffs Harbour over the October long weekend from Zooka to Junior League age divisions. At this stage, we are confident we will see increased team and player numbers from last year.

On a final note, this will be my last year as CLSC Chairman as I have accepted a position on the BNSW Board as an independent director. It is my intention to continue to advocate for the needs of Country Baseball in that role.
